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If you know where to look, there is a secret Leicester, full of fantastical creatures, mysterious people and hints of a forgotten past.

Follow these trails and keep your eyes peeled to discover where the city's gems are hidden.

As soon as you spot something, you'll score points. Watch out for traffic and take care crossing roads.

HERITAGE PANELS

These will help you answer historical questions.

Use them to find out more about the city's history and what Leicester looked like in the past.



WYVERN

A winged dragon (with two legs or none). They are part of Leicester's heraldic crest.



ANGELS



These are spiritual beings with wings, often seen as messengers of God.



CHERUB

These are young children with wings.



LIONS


On Victorian buildings, lions are symbols of dignity and kingliness. On the royal coat-of-arms the lion represents England.



These are not green!
They are carvings of men's faces surrounded by leaves, often with leaves growing out of their mouths and hair.
They symbolise rebirth.


